There was no Parish Council Meeting on the first Tuesday in January 2025. There will be a full report following the February Parish Council Meeting Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> February 2025. This gives us an opportunity to use this - months, "In Touch" to explain a bit more about your Parish Council.

Elected Parish Councils were first established in the Local Government Act 1894 to reinvigorate local communities and give them a voice. Since then, Parish councils have remained largely unchanged. It is not unusual for seats on Parish Councils to be uncontested, and for members to be co-opted where the number of candidates is fewer than the number of seats available.

Currently there are 15 seats on the Colsterworth & District Parish Council covering the villages of Colsterworth including Woolsthorpe by Colsterworth, North Witham and Lobthorpe, Gunby and Stainby. If you are interested in becoming a Councillor, please contact the Parish Clerk.

Your Parish Councillors are unpaid volunteers who represent the residents of the Parish.

Easton Walled Gardens opens for Snowdrops, and the 2025 season, on Wednesday 12th

The tea table was groaning with delectable goodies, the raffle table looked inviting and the competition table 'Something Sparkly' certainly lived up to its billing. But oh dear! The Flower of the month competition table was on the sparse side of Spartan with only 4 entries in all. The autumn and winter storms have certainly played havoc with our local gardens! We needed our dear Jane Ostler to give some context on the outdoor conditions. How we all miss her splendid reports of the natural world around us with her wonderful skill of weaving together the happenings and sightings sent by local people into the fascinating accounts, month after month, of the flora and fauna on our doorstep. Illness had kept some members at home, including our acting president Rachel Popham, but Pamela Harrison stepped up to the plate and at 2pm she opened the meeting by welcoming the 19 members attending and presenting Helen Scorror with a birthday card and good wishes for her special day.

Without further ado, Pamela then introduced the choir who had come along to entertain us. Ain't What You Do, more colloquially known as AWYD, are a group of friends who enjoy singing together in an a cappella style. They opened their set with a song familiar to most members, the 1958 Everly Brothers' number 'All I have to do is Dream'. With lovely harmonies and a melodious tune, it was an ideal beginning. There followed a broad selection of songs, some known some unfamiliar to members ranging from traditional gospel to songs from famous musicals. 'Hallelujah' was followed by 'Only You' a haunting ballad beautifully sung. 'Bring me little water, Sylvie' was accompanied by three of the ladies performing body percussion as they sang. Members watched in awe as the three sang the lyrics and accompanied them with a lovely series of hand movements, claps and foot taps. How they managed to keep time and sing was stunning and the applause reflected our admiration of this feat! 'All that Jazz' from the musical Chicago was well received. 

Bit late, but happy new year everyone. The attached photos show Jane and Brian Ostler sat on the new bench recently installed on the Colsterworth Nature Trail Flower Meadow. Also shown are some of the volunteers who installed the bench and who turn up regularly on a Monday afternoon and at other times to maintain the trail for the benefit of the villagers. The bench, now named 'Jane's Bench' replaces an earlier one that was installed by Brian more than ten years ago. After many years of use, the original bench was past its best and had become old and well worn, a bit like the volunteers, and needed replacement - the bench that is, not the volunteers. The purchase of the bench was very generously funded by donations from private individuals, the Rotary Club and Bob at the White Lion who held a number of fund-raising events on our behalf. I'd like to thank all of them for their generosity.

The original bench was installed by Brian to allow Jane to take a break during the regular nature surveys she carried out along the old railway line and what was eventually to become the Nature Trail. Jane has been involved in monitoring and recording along the old railway line since the early 1970s when quarrying for ironstone finished, the rail infrastructure was removed and, of particular interest to the volunteers, trees with thorns began to take over! In writing this article, Jane shared some of her recollections of the actions that resulted in the formation of the Nature Trail and I would like to share some of those.

As previously mentioned, the railway line was dismantled in the early 1970s and its connection to the main line was broken. At the time Jane was training at Stoke Rochford Teachers College and was very influenced by the Head of Biological Sciences, Don Wright. Don was a resident of Colsterworth village, a committed conservationist and volunteer for the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust. By 1980 Jane was working for the Nature Conservancy Council and, having moved into the village to be nearer to her husband Brian's work, had become more involved in the development and protection of the site. Successful efforts were made by Jane, Don, Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust and the County Council to include the nearby adjacent roadside into the Lincolnshire Protected Verge Scheme. This presented an opportunity for the old railway line, by now a footpath, to be incorporated into the Wildlife Trust's plans for a path stretching from the Leicestershire border to the Bridge end in Colsterworth.

The hard work began to clear the encroaching scrub - a familiar term with the current volunteers and a recurring theme of work along the Nature Trail. Pauline and John Chadwick were appointed trust reserve managers and, along with Jane and Brian began removing scrub. We regularly have twenty volunteers on a Monday fully employed doing the same thing. I can't imagine what it must have felt like facing the task with only a handful of people.

The condition of the path gradually improved and a public right of way was established leading across the path and down the recently constructed steps into the fields to the North. However, there remained problems with fly-tipping, dumping of garden waste and encroachment and damage of the landowners property. As a result it proved impossible to negotiate a new agreement with the landowners and the Wildlife Trust withdrew from managing the site. However, not all was lost. The landowners had sold land adjacent to the path for housing but enough land remained for the use of the old railway line by walkers. The Parish Council carried out a lot of work to show the long-term and continuous use of the site for recreation and walking and consequently the path received some level of protection from development. The path was now managed by the Parish Council who began the process of recruiting a team to run the vision they had in mind for the site; the path was now well on its way to becoming the Nature Trail it is today. Sadly, the gap over the road at the Bridge End could not be bridged and the proposal for a long distance footpath leading from Derbyshire to the East Coast had to be abandoned.

Jane's days of committees and politics may have ended, but her attachment to the local environment and the Nature Trail continues to this day. For many years Jane's Natural History Bulletins in the In Touch magazine have informed and entertained readers with information about wildlife and plant sightings around the villages, often accompanied by Jane's beautiful little drawings. You may not be aware, but since the 1970s Jane has kept a meticulous record of observations and significant dates that show the changing conditions of our local natural environment. This is a nationally significant resource and demonstrates Jane's commitment to both the natural environment and her local village.

Jane now joins the Nature Trail volunteers a couple of times each year in what, very quickly, becomes a guided nature walk. Jane's background as a botanist allows her to her to identify whatever obscure plant, leaf or flower are shown her and these are usually accompanied by an interesting and amusing anecdote about, for instance, how it got its name, or how it lived. Butterflies and insects are also identified, but with perhaps less confidence and fewer anecdotes than Jane's botanical career allows. Not to worry though, we have Martin Kew for that, our local Butterfly Conservation Representative- more about that next month.

In the meantime, and on behalf of all who have been informed and entertained by Jane over the years, I would like to thank her for the contribution she has made to village life. This is particularly relevant for the help given to an aerosystems engineer who still doesn't know his Rhinanthus minor from his Primus Spinoza.
