




### **Remembering Helen Bill**

There was no Parish Council Meeting in December 2020. There will be a full report following the February Parish Council Meeting on Tuesday 2nd February 2021. This gives us an opportunity to use this- months, "In Touch" to explain a bit more about your Parish Council.

Elected Parish Councils were first established in the Local Government Act 1894 to reinvigorate local communities and give them a voice. Since then Parish councils have remained largely unchanged. It is not unusual for seats on Parish Councils to be uncontested, and for members to be co-opted where the number of candidates is fewer than the number of seats available.

Currently there are 15 seats on the Colsterworth & District Parish Council covering the villages of Colsterworth, Woolsthorpe by Colsterworth, North Witham and Gunby, Stainby and Lobthorpe. There are Councillor vacancies for Colsterworth (x 3) and Stainby (x1). If you are interested in becoming a Councillor please contact the Parish Clerk. Your Parish Councillors are unpaid volunteers who represent the residents of the Parish Constituonov

## **Parish Council's Responsibilities**

Council Meetings

The Parish Council meets on the first Tuesday of every month at 7.30 p.m., except in January and August when there are no meetings.

#### **Remote Meetings**

The Government have issued regulations that give local authorities greater flexibility in the conduct of meetings, including allowing members to attend remotely, and for public and press access to those meetings. These 'Regulations' (The Local Authorities and Police and Crime Panels (Coronavirus) (Flexibility of Local Authorities and Police and Authority and Police and Crime Panel Meetings) (England and Wales) Regulations 2020) came into force on 4 April 2020.

Following the new regulations Colsterworth and District Parish Council are holding Parish Council meetings using the Zoom online meeting platform.

#### Before the meeting

The Agenda including a link to join the Zoom meeting will be placed on the website and on the notice board (if possible) as normal (i.e. with three clear days of notice).

Members of the public wishing to join the meeting need to contact the Clerk prior to the meeting via email or by calling the Clerk on 01476 861888 (Office hours only please)

A word on "The Sir Isaac Newton Memorial Hall"

The "Sir Isaac Newton Memorial Hall", more commonly called the "Colsterworth Village Hall", is managed by a small Committee of volunteers. The main purpose of the Village Hall is to provide a meeting, recreation and social facility for local groups and individuals. Sadly, this has not been possible during the Covid-19 pandemic. The Committee closed the Hall at the onset of the first lockdown and, regretfully, since then we have not been able to hire out the facility. We know how much people value the various village activities and, particularly, the social interaction which normally takes place in the Hall. So, when restrictions eased in the Summer, we assessed the situation. At that time, the Government issued guidelines to community groups who were considering re opening internal spaces.

We examined each of the guidelines, but regretfully concluded it was not possible for our small charity to meet all the requirements.

Therefore, the Hall has remained closed. Also due to the restrictions, the Committee made the decision to postpone the 2020 Annual General Meeting. It is the intention that as soon as we can ensure a Covid-secure meeting, we shall arrange a date and notify the details through "In Touch". In the meantime, both the Chairman's Annual Report and the 2019-20 Audited Accounts have been circulated electronically to Committee members.

Sadly, our Chairman, Francis Haw and our Secretary, Liz McCaig, have stepped down from the Committee. Both have contributed a number of years to the running of the Hall and the remaining Committee members will miss their input.

The Committee send sincere thanks to both Francis and Liz for their valued contributions.

# NATURAL HISTORY BULLETIN

By the time you receive this Bulletin, January will be over. It always seems a long month with less daylight and cold weather. With lockdown we have had to add self isolation, fear of illness and concern for the future. Never have we needed more of what Longfellow described as "nature that old nurse." He is an unfashionable poet these days but the following extract rings true:-And Nature, the old nurse , took The child upon his knee, Saying "Here is a story book Thy Father has written for thee.....

.....And whenever the way seemed long Or his heart began to fail She would sing a more wonderful song

Or tell a more marvellous tale." The tales you have shared in these bleak months have mainly been of birds. Thank you to those of you who sent sightings in for January 1st. Those sent from gardens were particularly welcome. Not enough to make generalisations but to support the idea for example that there are fewer finches, more wood pigeons and at least two parties of long tailed tits moving between bird feeders. The wren was not featured in many garden lists yet this shy little bird has over they years featured often in the bulletin – a nest in a hanging basket ,and one in a hollowed out gourd, both having successfully reared young. Balls of wrens keeping warm together in an old nest. One March a wren pulling out a fat green caterpillar from the depth of an evergreen shrub and manipulating it into a long thin shape before swallowing. More charmingly another catching a butterfly. Other lists came from targeted areas. A Cormorant joined the Little Egrets, Heron, Geese, Moorhen and Mallards in areas of



Wren at Nest



the River Witham. Along a well grown hedge there were Linnets, Skylarks and Yellowhammers sheltering. Tree Sparrows and Tree Creepers on the Stamford Road were also discovered at another site. On the Nature Trail the winter visitors of Redwing and Fieldfare were feeding on berries and fallen apples. In Twyford Wood there was the migrant Lesser Redpoll. These records and many others will be kept for future reference and we will have another day in the summer to add to the more than 50 species listed in this small survey.

A dog Fox added to the eerie feel of a winters night as it called for a mate – not so much a bark as something between a scream and a howl. Fallow as well as Muntjac Deer seen in Twyford Wood. The only notes on invertebrates were a Queen Wasp emerging from logs brought into the house, 20 Garden snails hibernating on a wall (good news for the Song Thrush in the Spring. A Wood Louse colony under a large flower pot. Only the Gorse was in flower at the end of the Nature Trail but in the gardens and hedgerows there were the first flowers of Snowdrops. A single patch of Lesser Celandine had flowers.

To Look For In February Plants targeted for first flowering because of their response to climatic conditions are Hazel, Lesser Celandine and Coltsfoot, followed by Blackthorn. First full bird songs should be noted, particularly Blackbird, Song Thrush and Great Tit. Rooks, Crows and Jackdaws have already started nest building. On a mild day Butterflies like the Peacock, and Small Tortoiseshell may emerge to sun on a wall. If you have suitable plants in flower in the garden you may see the first emergence of Queen Bumble Bees. They loved the old house, parts dating back 400 years. Mum would often emphasise the responsibility she felt she had towards it.

Mum and Dad slotted into village life quickly and came to love the people of Colsterworth and the village. Delighted to be so close to the church of Saint John the Baptist, Elizabeth attended as often as she could, though more infrequently as she became frailer and more immobile. In earlier years, Mum loved to invite everyone over from the church after the Christmas Day service. Naturally, we all became regulars at the White Lion's splendid restaurant and bar in no time.

Their daughter Catherine, Nigel and grandchildren, Tim and Chris, often visited Colsterworth from their home near Stamford. It was also a house where her 'Mexican family' (their son Philip, Yolanda, and grandchildren Charles and Alexander) loved to come and stay during summer holidays. Whenever possible, all ten family members would come together for a joyful evening meal, followed – for the adults – by a brisk walk up School Lane and an essential visit to the pub.

Maurice and Elizabeth were honoured and delighted to be asked to turn on the Christmas lights in 2014. After Dad passed away in spring 2015, Mum stayed in the village on her own but finally sold the Manor House – far too big a property for an old lady on her own, even accompanied by her beloved dog. She moved to Stamford to live nearer Catherine and family.
