# Parish Council Report

### HEADLINES FROM THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING TUESDAY 5<sup>TH</sup> MAY 2020

This was the first remote Annual General Parish Council meeting through the Zoom video and audio communications system.

### Public Forum

There were no members of the public in attendance. **Chairperson Remarks** 

Chair of the Council Caroline Hainsworth opened the meeting at 7.35pm and started by acknowledging that these were strange times. She thanked the Clerk for putting together the remote Annual General Parish Council meeting and all Councillors who were able to join the meeting. Chairperson Hainsworth confirmed that the change in legislation allowing Parish Councils to meet remotely did not extend to the Annual Parish Meeting and closed her remarks by hoping that everyone was keeping well.

### Election of Chair and Vice Chair of the Council

It was unanimously agreed that the current Chair of the Council Councillor C Hainsworth and Vice Chair Councillor Ramage remain as Chair and Vice Chair of the Council. Election of Lead Councillors for:

Finance and Administration Committee Councillors A Bouvie, L McShane, M Ramage and C Hainsworth were duly elected.

Environment and Amenities Working Party It was agreed to keep the current members Councillor's C Russell and M Ramage with the addition of Councillor D. Cox.

Highways and Footpaths Working Party
It was agreed to keep the current members Councillors C
Hainsworth, L Bennett and J Clark.

### **County/District Councillor Report**

District Councillor Bellamy made the following reports:-

South Kesteven District Council (SKDC) had set up a portal for people that needed help. Three thousand letters have been sent out to people identified as vulnerable and a database of volunteers who would provide help had also been set up.

SKDC had had been successful in getting out its Small Business Grants (not COVID-19 related).

The first Planning Committee meetings since the start of the Pandemic were scheduled for the following week but he was not aware that these included any local planning to Colsterworth and District.

### Updates for Council administration

The following polices were reviewed and unanimously agreed.

- 1. Draft CAD Delegation Flow Chart May 2020.
- 2. Draft Standing Örders May 2020.
- 3. Draft Financial Regulations May 2020.

It was unanimously agreed to defer The Draft Code of Conduct to a later meeting to be consulted along with the Social Media and Communications policy.

**Parish Council Insurance Renewal** - Unanimously agreed to renew with the existing insurers BHIB who continue to offer good cover and service levels at a competitive premium.

### External Audit

The Annual Governance Statement section 1 was approved.

The Annual Governance Statement Section 1 was signed by the Chair of the Council C Hainsworth and the Clerk. The Annual Governance Statement Acc section 2 was approved

The Annual Governance Statement section 2 was signed by the Chair of the Council C Hainsworth and the Clerk. The Accounting Statement 2019/2020 was approved. <u>Finance</u>

Accounts for payment were approved by Council. It was agreed to transfer £10,000 from the Community Bank Account to the Community Savings Account.

<u>Playgrounds remain closed</u> - Playgrounds at Colster Way, Old Post Lane, Woolsthorpe Road and North Witham remain closed until further notice as per the Government guidance.



## NATURAL HISTORY BULLETIN




After a month without the Bulletin, first a check list of the main seasonal developments since 21/5/20 when the last one was written.

Swallows. House Martins and Swifts are back, the first two in lower numbers. The first 6 Swifts were seen on 6th May and then 13 more two days later. Chiffchaff, Willow Warbler, Whitethroats on the Nature Trail but records from woods not available because of lockdown. The first sighting of a cuckoo was on 21st April and one has been heard since. No reports of spotted Flycatchers which have previously nested in gardens. The problem for these migrants is not loss of habitat here but the immense changes on their route back to Britain and the reduced numbers in insects when they get here. We have had no Turtle Doves for several years. Of our native birds reports have been from gardens and hedgerows. Nesting success includes that for Chaffinch, House Sparrows, Tree Sparrows,

Greenfinch, Blackbird, Song Thrush, Crow, Rook, Collared Dove, Wood Pigeon, Robin, Wren, Blue Tit, Great Tit and Coal Tit. Skylarks seen on ground (nesting) and singing high in sky. A photograph of a Young Woodpecker was sent in. Jackdaws nesting in a box put up for Tawny Owls. A White Tailed Sea Eagle seen on more than one occasion flying above Old Post Lane. Possibly one from the introductions on the Isle of Wight which have been reported as far north as South Yorkshire.

The lack of traffic may account for the lack of road kills reported particularly of Badger and Hedgehog. Several gardens, some with web cams have families of Hedgehogs. Evidence of Rabbits is very welcome since they have been notable for their absence for over a year. A Grass Snake crossing a road was probably heading for a nearby pond with tadpoles. Some ponds have had more tadpoles this year some less and two none at all after years of them being in abundance. Only one report of a Toad but Newts plentiful. The first Butterflies in gardens have been Small Tortoiseshell, Peacock and Brimstone. Then Large and Small Whites, Green Veined whites and abundant Orange Tips. Holly Blues have been plentiful too. Red Admirals not seen until early May. Plenty of activity by all five species of common Bumble Bees along with the non-social bees like the Mining and Mason Bees but fewer Honey Bees.



The Bulletin is not meant to be just lists. Many of us have had more time to observe and enjoy our surroundings. Blackbirds and Robins feeding newly fledged young have seemed tamer. One bizarre instance was of a male Blackbird carrying dead young away from nest until it was empty. Then the female building a new nest in what seemed an unsuitable open area of a climbing rose. The pair are now feeding a new family in plain sight of the homeowners sitting nearby. A 'bee hotel' (see illustration) was a 'hive of activity' over a couple of weeks in April as the Red Mason Bees tunnelled out. mated with the dancing Males and built new homes for their young filling the tunnels again. Meanwhile the striped Nomad bees waited outside ready to take over like cuckoos. A new hotel was added after it was found that the bees had moved on to block up an overflow pipe.



## Ford Footbridge, North Witham, LINCOLNSHIRE

Lincolnshire County Council intends to carry out maintenance works to the ford footbridge at North Witham.

The anticipated start date for the Ford Footbridge replacement is the 6th July 2020 and is programmed to last 3 weeks. Due to the current COVID-19 situation, the start date may be pushed back.

In order to carry out the works safely and efficiently traffic management will be required at the location. Due to the location of the structure and the nature of the works, a road closure will be the most suitable option. LCC are proposing to close the area of carriageway that they will be working on and create a short diversion route. Details of the diversion routes are shown below.
