There was no Parish Council Meeting in August 2022. There will be a full report following the September Parish Council Meeting on Tuesday 6th September 2022. This gives us an opportunity to use this- months, "In Touch" to explain a bit more about your Parish Council.

The Parish Council meets on the first Tuesday of every month at 7.30 p.m. except in January and August when there are no meetings.

Elected Parish Councils were first established in the Local Government Act 1894 to reinvigorate local communities and give them a voice. Since then, Parish councils have remained largely unchanged. It is not unusual for seats on Parish Councils to be uncontested, and for members to be co-opted where the number of candidates is fewer than S22/1249 - Solar PV system totalling ~ 0.376MWp on the the number of seats available.

Your Parish Councillors are unpaid volunteers who Colsterworth Grantham NG33 5LY. represent the residents of the Parish.

Currently there are 15 seats on the Colsterworth & District Parish Council covering the villages of Colsterworth, Woolsthorpe by Colsterworth, North Witham, Gunby, Stainby and Lobthorpe. There ais one Councillor vacancy for Colsterworth and one Councillor Vacancy for Gunby & Stainby. Why are we telling you all this?



NATURAL HISTORY BULLETIN

Lots of records, mostly from gardens in the extreme weather of drought and heatwaves. Thankyou to you all.

BIRDS By 1st August 22, all Swifts had left, first the adults at the end of August leaving behind good numbers circling the sky at night before they set off, finding their way back without the guidance of their parents. A Swallow was seen feeding a young on a roof on 12th August 22. Some first broods have failed. Fewer House Martins have occupied nests at previous sites. About a dozen birds seen regularly in the sky above Woolsthorpe. Buzzard watched feeding young at nest in tree between Houses and field. Same nest occupied by Buzzards last year. Red Kite now coming regularly into some gardens. With many fewer pheasants released this year they are now finding some Rabbits as road Casualties. Two coveys of English Partridge which have been successful in recent years due to field margins being managed for wildlife, have not been seen. The most astonishing record has been of two Peregrine falcons in a tree between the Nature Trail and a garden.

Two Long-tailed Tits, regular visitors to a bird feeder with fat balls now bring with them their six young. In another garden Blue Tits whose chicks died before they fledged have not rebuilt, but in another garden Goldfinches have returned to nest after an absence of several years.

OTHER VERTEBRATES Almost every pond, it seems has had a Grass Snake visiting. Here they have been the scourge of adult Frogs which in the hot, dry weather have been resting up in the water instead of in the shade of vegetation. With the return of Rabbits, now recovered from disease which almost wiped them out four years ago, there have been more sightings of stoats – including one moving its family across the road (to a safer site?). Several people have commented on the number of Hares they have seen out in the daytime and their have been two reported on roads, one on Woolsthorpe Road and one on Old Post Lane. Both soon disappeared as carrion. Muntjac Deer droppings found at side of garden pond. An exciting report of 6 Bats flying regularly in one garden. From information received we seem like the Hedgehog capital of the region. At least 8 houses with 'hedgehog hotels' occupied In one garden 6 which feed regularly later brought along a young one. Several people have also the pleasure of watching them on camcorders. An increasing number of people have learned how best to care for them in long run and are themselves sources of sound advice.



INSECTS On 8th August 22 Yellow Ants flying in a garden. Brown Hawker Dragonflies seen regularly both near ponds and along hedgerows. At other ponds the Broad bodied Chaser and the

Common Darter Dragonflies. Many reports of Humming Bird Hawkmoths. It is interesting to note what tubular flowers they are feeding from as some of their favourites are already seeding. Elephant Hawk Moth Caterpillars created a lot of interest last year and the first photos have come in of them fully grown in threat position. Of the Butterfly records most notable have been the numbers of Red Admirals and of Holly Blues. Large Whites doing very well. They are not called Cabbage Whites for nothing. If you are lucky enough to still have some young greens in garden you will need to keep them off.



To Look For In September. Note the plants still flowering – so many of them belong to the Daisy and Dandelion families. Have Grasshoppers survived? In many places there is no grass left! 
The list is almost endless and I am sure as you read this your mind will be thinking of your own list.


