Parish Council Report

There was no Parish Council Meeting on the first Tuesday in January 2023. There will be a full report following the February Parish Council Meeting which has been brought forward to Tuesday 24th January 2023. This gives us an opportunity to use this - months, "In Touch" to explain a bit more about your Parish Council.

Elected Parish Councils were first established in the Local Government Act 1894 to reinvigorate local communities and give them a voice. Since then, Parish councils have remained largely unchanged. It is not unusual for seats on Parish Councils to be uncontested, and for members to be co-opted where the number of candidates is fewer than the number of seats available.

Currently there are 15 seats on the Colsterworth & District Parish Council covering the villages of Colsterworth including Woolsthorpe by Colsterworth, North Witham and Lobthorpe, Gunby and Stainby. If you are interested in becoming a Councillor, please contact the Parish Clerk.

PARISH COUNCIL'S RESPONSIBILITIES Council Meetings

The Parish Council meets on the first Tuesday of every month at 7.30 p.m. except in January and August when ordinarily there are no meetings. Before the meeting a public forum is held at which members of the public may speak. The Parish Council is Responsible for Village Maintenance

The Parish Council has the responsibility for parts of the villages' maintenance, such as grass cutting, repairing notice boards and bus shelters in the villages. Allotments

There are allotments at Stamford Road and Woolsthorpe Road. It is very rewarding when you see your own fruit and vegetables growing – taste the difference! Contact the Parish Clerk on 01476 861888 and see if there is one available or place your name on the waiting list.

Play Areas

The Council maintains the Play Areas at Colster Way, Woolsthorpe Road, Newton Grange and by North Witham village hall <u>Old Post Lane Cemetery</u> The management of the Old Post Lane cemetery includes the provision of burial plots and maintenance. Defibrillators

The Council maintains the five defibrillators which are located :- 1. Outside the White Lion Public House. 2. Outside Colsterworth Village Hall. 3. Woolsthorpe Road, in the old telephone kiosk. 4. Outside Little Legs premises on Colster Way. 5. Outside North Witham Village Hall.

<u>Finance</u> The Council has the authority to raise a precept to finance its expenditure.

Traffic and Highways

The Parish Council would like regular contact with LCC Highways to try and resolve speeding, maintenance, signage and other problems (also in consultation with the Police)

Policing and Crime Prevention The Council is active in working with the Police in reducing and preventing crime in the villages.

<u>Clearing Litter</u>

Twp part-time Litter-pickers are employed to keep the villages tidy. Planning

The Council is a statutory consultee in planning but has no decision-making powers.

Parish Plan

The implementation of the Parish Plan is a high priority. Footpaths and Rights of Way

The Council is active in having footpaths and rights of way kept open and clear.

<u>Grants</u> Grants may be given for local groups but are proportionate to the number of people who would benefit.

<u>Seats</u>

The Council will consider the provision of seat that would benefit parishioners.

War Memorial

The Council previously had a project to investigate restoration of the War Memorial and at the December 2022 Parish Council meeting it was agreed for Cllr T Neale to start a dialogue with Colsterworth Festival of Remembrance (CFoR) to investigate working in partnership to support the restoration of the War Memorial.

Nature & Wildlife

The Council supports biodiversity projects in the Parish and particularly supports the Nature Trail on the old Railway Line.

Lincolnshire County Council is responsible for maintaining the county's adopted roads and footpaths. You can report a fault on the following website:

Have your say on levels of Council Tax for 2023/24

South Kesteven District Council is working hard to maintain good levels of service in areas such as cleaning streets, collecting refuse and providing social housing in a challenging economic climate. The Council remains ambitious and is doing all it can to reduce costs and attract funding from other sources.

Projects we have been concentrating on include supporting households and local businesses, providing opportunities for growth and building new council homes.

The Council is also responsible for the administration of various schemes which help households and businesses cope with cost-of-living increases including the Household Support Fund, the Council Tax Support Scheme and the Business Rates Relief Scheme.

To enable this work to continue, South Kesteven District Council is currently proposing to increase its element of Council Tax by £5 a year (per Band D property) from April 2023. This will generate around £250,000 of additional funding.



NATURAL HISTORY BULLETIN

January 1st 2022 last year) was the warmest on record with temperatures reaching 16C. Looking back through previous local reports 2007 was also described as exceptional in terms of early flowering. However what was once considered extreme events are now routine. The first week of January saw the following wild plants in flower. Snowdrops, violets and hazel (both male and female plants. A key species for recording Nature's Calendar is Lesser Celandine and this was found out on Old Post Lane. There were fewer relicts of plants still flowering from last year. In one garden white dead nettle was an exception. In the same garden plants grown for early emerging insects - like winter honeysuckle, sweet box, rosemary, winter jasmine, cyclamen coum and grape oregon were all in flower but no early bees or butterflies awakened from hibernation this year as days of frosts took over from wet and stormy weather.



No tree sets seed so readily, nor grows as easily into a sapling which may live to be a veteran, as the ash. It is a tragedy, therefore that the disease spreading so rapidly throughout the country was brought in from imported trees. What prompted this was the demand for huge numbers of trees needed to fulfil the requirements of ambitious plantings of new woodlands which our nurserymen couldn't meet in the timescale set out. Now it seems not only young trees are affected but old trees are also condemned - trees which are protecting us now in so many ways - as a necessary support to all kinds of wildlife, as an aid to cleaner air and a way to lock up carbon. Locally self set mature trees are found along old railway lines and along hedges and in corners of fields - anywhere in fact in which they have been allowed to grow. In winter the tall silhouette with initial branches almost at right angles and from them stems which sweep down before turning upwards, are distinctive. The buds are broad and like black velvet, The ash is the first of our trees to lose its compound leaves and the last to develop them in Spring, but has tiny flowers in clusters before this. Ash was once part of the rural economy and also the subject of legends, including of its healing power.

At the beginning of the month there were signs of early nesters anticipating the new seasons. Members of the crow family common crow, rook, magpies, jackdaws were all seen to be about in pairs - some like the rooks returning to their nesting sites. Jackdaws back at chimneys and some at more unusual sites used last year, like an owl box. Spring has always made false starts and now smaller birds may make a brief false starts. A blue tit was heard in song, two robins in a garden, not fighting, a sure sign of a pair . The male tilted back to show off his red breast - the female with an equally red breast appearing to ignore him but staying near whilst pecking at nothing much. The promiscuous dunnock starts early with his low, apologetic song and can be the main sound in a garden in the evening,

A blue tit seen visiting a hole in a stone wall where it nested last year may have been considering it for the same purpose again, but it may also be seeking the spiders and ants which made it such a good feeding site too. For now the struggle simply to suvive in the cold goes on. Blackbirds which in December gathered in numbers round fallen apples in gardens seemed to disperse but have

returned. In one garden as six males quarrled and fought each other off a house sparrow fed unconcerned amongst them. A wren found a green caterpillar. In 2007 in the same garden a wren found one at the base of iris stems and beat it to a long thin shape before swallowing it. A barn owl was heard to screech. This is a bird not often heard since it relies on silence to be a successful predator. Its flight feathers and its shape when swooping designed to make no sound.

An unusual sighting at the end of December was of a Jack Snipe, recognised, not only by its smaller size, but by its reluctance to fly, which it does in a straight line, unlike the Snipe which ziz zags upwards. It is camouflaged in vegetation but if it can be seen has a bobbing motion as it moves. Alongside the River Witham two Little Egrets have been seen together and the Heron is back, seen regularly flying west to where its nesting site is. A very young muntjac seen out with an adult is a sign that some animials seem to ignore the seasons and continue breeding throughout the year.

Have you an interesting tree in your garden. Have just received some fascinating information about an apple tree (no not Sir Isaac Newtons) which is nearly 100 years old so more about this next time. Look out for ash trees, early flowers, birds starting courtship, those at the bird tables and in wet places wading birds. Hares already seen this month with two chasing a third, often start Mad March behaviour early.
