This gives us an opportunity to meetings. use this months, "In Touch" to mention some of the highlights and achievements of the Parish Council since the beginning of 2023.

InTouch Colour Magazine

The first colour InTouch edition commemorated King Charles III Coronation and was followed by two more editions. After this successful and well received trial period, it was agreed at the Parish Council meeting 6<sup>th</sup> June that the magazine would continue in colour.

**SK Community Fund Grant** of £1,124.49 for Coronation Events The Parish Council was successful in obtaining a grant, which was used to pay for: -

- Coronation bunting which was placed around all the villages in the Parish by 5 volunteers.
- Coronation Commemorative medals for all nursery and primary school children.
- The first colour edition of the InTouch magazine to commemorate the Coronation of King Charles III.

**SK Prosperity Fund Grant for the Nature Trail** 

£1200 was awarded to the Parish Council for a survey to assess the condition of the trees along the Nature Trail, which will be conducted in Autumn 2023.

**War Memorial Restoration Project** 

The project has re-stared as a joint venture with the Parish Council and Colsterworth Festival of Remembrance. The Parish Council has agreed to pledge up to £3,500 in reserves so that Grant applications can be taken forward.

**Woolsthorpe Road Play Area Repairs** 

The annual play area inspections highlighted that there were gaps and trip hazards on the existing rubber tiles and recommended replacing the complete surfaces. Three quotations were obtained and at the February 2023 meeting it was agreed to have Wicksteed Leisure Limited resurface the areas with Carpet Surfacing at a cost of £5,600 excl vat. This was completed in February 2023.

North Witham Play Area

Early in the year several areas of the eco-tumble surface were identified as soft and spongy and reported to the supplier Wicksteed Leisure Limited under their guarantee policy. After a follow up by Cllr Jon Clark, they repaired the surface under guarantee at no cost to the Parish Council.

### Vehicle Activated Signs (VAS)

Two VAS signs were installed: one on Post Lane, North Witham and one on Woolsthorpe Road, at the entrance to the village before Apple Tree Close, at a cost of £4,900 excl vat.

### Community Speed Watch (CSW)

CSW is being re-stared in the Autumn with several new volunteers and existing volunteers following CSW training, arranged for 21st August 2023. Thank you to the new and existing volunteers.

# NATURAL HISTORY BULLETIN

August seems to be a month for aliens and adventives – that is for non-native plants and those which turn up in unexpected places. Garden escapes include Blue Sowthistle (Cicerbita macrophylla) in flower along a jitty in Woolsthorpe where it escaped several years ago from a garden of one of the oldest houses. It is more violet blue than the otherwise very similar Chicory (Cichorium intybus). This has been found on field margins. It is possibly a relict from the times when it was grown as a forage plant.



Scattered bird seed has produced non native grasses but also the spectacular flowers of Wonder of Peru. In flower in August from purchased wild flower mix is a plant long established since introduction from California in 1832 is Phacelia. Its spikes of blue flowers is very attractive to bees. Other plants amongst these mixes designed to recreate meadows are vigorous waste ground species like Mugwort. However they may have been dormant as seed already present and taken advantage of the new conditions.

One strikingly beautiful plant found at the edge of a new pond, is a cause of considerable concern. Himalayan Balsam is a tall vigorous plant with large two lipped flowers opening in front of a pouch ending in a spur. It has seed pods which explode open at the slightest touch. They scatter the seeds over long distances. It would be very damaging should it get onto our riversides, forming as it does a dense continuous line, excluding everything else.




HIMALAYAN BALSAM

On 3rd August, after weeks of cool, wet weather, several people reported an influx of butterflies in their gardens in a brief spell of sunshine. One garden counted the numbers of eleven species in half an hour. Large and Small Whites (11+), Red Admiral (8), Peacock(7), Brimstone (3 male) Ringlets (2) Gatekeeper (1) Meadow Brown (1), Small Tortoiseshell (1) Comma (1) and the first pair of the new brood of Holly Blues in a dancing flight.

The Red Admiral is one of our largest and most colourful butterflies, called together by early enthusiasts as the 'aristocrats' They were given noble names like Peacock, Purple Emperor. It was once, like the Painted Lady only seen as a migrant, arriving in summer and unable to hibernate through our winters. Milder, shorter winters has meant that it can now do so. The pristine condition of those

seen suggest that they have not had to travel from Europe or North Africa.



Records of the Humming Bird Hawk Moth continue to come in. In one garden two regular visitors have moved from the honeysuckle to the Soapwort.

Froglets have now moved from the ponds to the shelter during day of surrounding vegetation. One exception stays perched on an ornamental fountain some distance away.

Hedgehogs continue to benefit from the care afforded them in many gardens. In one case two young deserted by their mother could not be saved, in spite of following advice from a Hedgehog Rescue Centre.

Photos sent in of a live Pigmy Shrew found inside on the floor. Unharmed but perhaps brought in by the cat, it was released into a safe place.

### TO LOOK FOR IN SEPTEMBER



After a year of hard work by Jane, a lot of form filling, gathering innumerable quotes for work and many anxious times the Village Hall was awarded a substantial grant from FCC Community Foundation to carry out major renovation work which we hope by the time you read this will be well underway. The work will see a great deal of renovation, renewals and alterations to the structure of the building to bring it up to date while not changing its much-loved character and charm. A new kitchen, doors, heating system, external cladding, and new windows are some highlights of the work about to be undertaken. There'll be lots of opportunities for our wonderful volunteers to help in the coming months as the project gets underway!

When the renovation work has been completed, we'll have a wonderfully updated facility for years to come. The commercial grade kitchen will mean we'll be able to prepare and cook food on site, rather than volunteers cooking at home – no more last-minute dashing through the village with everyone's meals!


