## Parish Council Report

### Your headlines from the Parish Council (PC) Meeting 3<sup>rd</sup> October 2023

Chairperson C Hainsworth welcomed the 4 members of the public present. 2 requested to speak and 2 were attending in support of those speaking

The first member of the public spoke in support of their application to be Co-opted as Parish Councillor for Gunby and Stainby. They were then invited to stay until agenda item 2023.86.

The second member of the public introduced themselves as a resident from Gunby and wished to highlight the proposed Anaerobic Digestion Plant on land off Gunby Road, near Sewstern. They handed the Parish Council a prepared document of the key points they believe will affect all of the Parishes. Below is a summary of the verbal account that the speaker gave from that document which includes but not limited to the following:

The size and scale of the proposed development. 1

Sewstern Industrial Estate is served by a single carriage 2. road. The Neighbourhood Plan does not consider Gunby a sustainable village.

The proposed plant will be on a Greenfield site of 6 hectares. 3. Predominantly feeding into it will be Maize. The speaker went on to list environmental damage to soil and the fresh-water system inhabited by protected species. The tree screening is likely to take 30yrs to reach

the height of the plant, 19 meters.The site will be similar to the one in Oxford which was reported to have exploded the previous evening.

The resident finished by encouraging all Councillors to 5. attend the Consultations on the 10th and 11th October 2023 at Sewstern Village hall.

The Public Forum was extended to 7.52pm to allow all those present to speak.

Chairperson Cllr Hainsworth welcomed everyone to the meeting with no remarks of significance.

### Lincolnshire County Council and South Kesteven District Councillors Report.

LCC Cllr C Vernon Report: -

LCC will receive £10 million for Road Maintenance. The Council will be prioritising how this is spent with having such a large road network in the County.

2. The LCC Volunteer Scheme is taking on projects with local communities. These projects only cost what the materials cost - labour is donated by the CVS volunteers for free.

Call Connect service is capped at £2 per journey. Cllr J Clark 3 raised a question on routes and direction of travel which Cllr C Vernon will look into.

Earlier that day Cllr C Vernon had spent with LCC Highways Manager Rowan Smith visiting areas of the division. They stressed this was not in place of the High Street issues walk around which they are still pursuing with Rowan Smith. SKDC CIIr D Bellamy Report :

At the last meeting of the new SKDC administration the 5 subject of buying council houses and building some was discussed. Cllr D Bellamy commented that some on Bourne Road Estate are in need of repair.

Little Bytham has been awarded £60K from the South Kesteven Prosperity Fund and £100K from LCC Communities Foundation for a new play park.

LED streetlights are still being rolled out by SKDC. 7

8. The new bin depot is being moved to an area near the new Grantham Police Station.

SKDC Cllrs B Green sent their apologies.

Cllr B Green could not make the meeting but is promoting 9 the Armed Forces Covenant and urges residents to complete the Council Tax Support Scheme survey.

The Clerk will circulate an email from Cllr B Green to all Cllrs 10. regarding the Armed Forces Covenant and the Council Tax Support Scheme survey.

### Co-Option for Cllr for Colsterworth

Mrs R Chatterton was unanimously approved as Cllr for Gunby & Stainby

Parish Council Wreath Laying responsibility for Remembrance Day Sunday 12th November 2023. A short discussion took place and Cllr D Bellamy volunteered to lay the wreath with Cllr C Russell being available if required.

Agreed to purchase a Poppy Wreath from Royal British Legion (RBL) up to £20. (S.137 Expenditure). Agreed unanimously with Cllr T Neale offering to make the £20 donation to RBL for the poppy wreath. Resolved to switch on the Christmas Lights at St John the Baptist Church at 6.30pm on Friday 1st December 2023.

Unanimously agreed to invite 2 local residents who have been generous with their time, various donations and acts of good will to the community.

Cllr C Vernon added that it was possible to swap volunteers with another village.

Cllr C Vernon confirmed again that the time spent with Rowan Smith that day was in addition to the High Street road safety issues walk about to be scheduled.

### **Environment & Amenities Working Group Report.**

War Memorial Project update (Cllr T Neale) (S Grant – Clerk) 1. The Clerk confirmed that the FCC Grant application Minute ref 5th September 2023.77.4 had been submitted before the deadline of 6th September and an acknowledgement received with a request for further information which has been submitted.

Cllr T Neale informed the Council that this would be his last 2. meeting as he was standing down as a Parish Councillor. He thanked Cllr C Hainsworth and the Clerk for the work they had done so far in exploring and making grant applications for the restoration of the War Memorial

Cllr C Hainsworth reported that Colsterworth Festival of 3 Remembrance (CFoR) had submitted an application to the South Kesteven Prosperity Fund and the National Heritage Lottery fund. War Memorial Trust Grant Application (Cllr C Hainsworth) It was resolved that the Parish Council apply for the War Memorial Trust Grant up to

maximum of 50% of eligible costs using the lowest quotation of £27,923.00 excl vat (on a Price-Only basis) - next closing date October 31/10/2023.

## NATURAL HISTORY BULLETIN

A LOOK BACK. The first bulletin was in the November 2006 edition of In Touch. Its aim was to provide a forum for anyone who had an interest in the future of plants and animals in our parishes at a time when local plans were being developed. It had the support and help from Don Wright, head of Biological Sciences at Kesteven college of Education Teacher's Training College during my time there. He was also a leading member of the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust. The bulletin has never been "my nature diary" (You could check how many times the word 'l' appears in anything except the "to look for" section). The first bulletin begins by thanking the many people who sent interesting sightings.

What has been a pleasant surprise is the number of October records in 2006 which could have been written today:-Collared Doves sitting on nests. High numbers of Red Admiral Butterflies and a good year for Holly Blues Humming Bird Hawk Moths hovering over late flowers

Muntjak Deer a hazard as they crossed the A1 into the village.

It was not until June 2007 that I included my first line drawing. It was a line drawing of a lichen that the Brownies had discovered on a willow tree just off Old Post Lane. A description was not adequate to convey it to those unfamiliar with lichens. These illustrations have continued ever since, emphasising structure even when colour is now available in the magazine. Many are done with reference to the photos sent in by email or whenever possible from the actual specimens. The 2008 November edition has a drawing of Hornbeam fruits as like this year the trees were laden. Usually now I include two drawings - soon approaching a total of 200!

It would take a booklet to summarise the changes which have taken place since 2006. A few are given here:-

Less involvement of children. More involvement of people who are finally convinced of the value of observations of the every day. More involvement of people new to the village which has included those with special interests. The rise of the internet. It was apparent early on that e-mails were preferred by some people but the importance of personal contact by phone, notes through the door or even calling remains. A conscious decision not to use social media because of the dangers of unverified anonymous or confidential information. Those with the ability to use the internet for identification can be successful. I am no longer 'the fount of all wisdom' but it must be remembered the this depends on the reliability of the internet source and that some species can't be identified by this method.

Plants and animals - gains. Mature trees – those planted by individuals decades ago and by groups, particularly Tree For Life and British Steel Meadows and Chalk and Limestone grassland which has been managed for Conservation (Work of Nature Trail volunteers and Lincs Wildlife Trust Roadside Verges)

Butterflies including establishment and management of Reserves in Twyford Wood and move south of species. Gardens – particularly for Hedgehogs and pond life

### Plants and animals - losses.

Mature Trees Ash felling due to disease has added to what seems the inevitable result of concerns over health and safety and the demands of an increasing population

Insects Populations have crashed in both diversity and numbers. This affects all animals above them in the food chain – ultimately for example, birds of prey. Alien plants and animals. From harlequin ladybirds, to American Crayfish from waterplants to those from bird seed Migrant birds – No more turtle doves, no more breeding spotted flycatchers, cuckoos and swallows greatly reduced. Disease. For example in rabbits, trees

October 2023. Little space for the interesting records and observations received – Alien plant Indian pokeweed as weed in garden, an unusual and special find of a slowworm in same garden. A new colony of house sparrows in a tall garden hedge. Groups of inkcaps on a lawn. Tree colours changing late this year and effects of heatwave. Tawny owls calling to each other heard from a garden in dark. Large number of squirrels. A rabbit showing signs of disease. Late migrants passing south, high in sky. Emergence of high numbers of ladybirds (harlequins?)
