PUBLIC FORUM:

Cllr C Hainsworth (Chair) welcomed everyone to the meeting and acknowledge the three persons present at the Public Forum.

The first to speak raised awareness of the V E Day 80th Anniversary next year and asked that the Parish Council liaise with the Social Club and Colsterworth Festival of Remembrance (CFoR) to arrange a joint event to celebrate this occasion. Inviting people to take their own picnic tables and picnic to bring all the community together. They suggested the Parish Council runs a V E Day House Decorating competition with the Parish Council giving a bottle of wine to the winner.

The second member of the public spoke about a recent article in the In Touch magazine relating to the *Bowls Club car park and stated that they were a member of the Bowls Club Committee. A short discussion took place with Cllr J Clark stating that this was being discussed as an agenda item later in the meeting and suggested the member of the public stays to observe this.

Bin collections- Let Cllr Green know of any issues. They were aware of some missed collections due to the recent road works in Woolsthorpe by Colsterworth and that a Green bin lorry was full before it had completed its round due to the extra vegetation growth.

They reminded everyone it was important to vote on Thursday.

A1 LED improvements



We'll be upgrading the current lighting to LEDs on the A1 between Blyth and Colsterworth.

The new LED lighting will be more energy efficient and require less maintenance in the future.

When will this work take place?

We'll work overnight, between 8pm and 6am, for approximately 6 weeks, Monday to Friday.

In order to carry out our work safely, we'll close the slip road, lanes and carriageways for the safety of our workforce and road users.

What does this mean for you?

During closures, fully signed diversions will be in place. For our first week of work the diversions are as follow:

Mon 29 July – One night - Elkesly Bridge: Northbound carriageway and Southbound lane 2. Tues 30 July – Two nights - Elkesly Bridge: Northbound carriageway and Southbound lane 2 and Dover Btm exit and entry Slips.

Mon 2 Sep – Four nights – Colsterworth: Southbound carriageway and Northbound lane 2 and B6403.

Fri 6 Sep – Three nights – Colsterworth: Southbound carriageway and Northbound lane 2, B6403 and A151.

Wed 11 Sep – One night – Colsterworth: Northbound carriageway and B6403

Thu 12 Sep - Three nights - Colsterworth: Northbound carriageway and A151.

Access for emergency service vehicles will be maintained throughout.

We'll make every effort to ensure the impact on the local community and travelling public is kept to a minimum. We always aim to work to the programme, however unforeseen circumstances or adverse weather conditions may mean changes.

Colsterworth WI Meeting 18th June 2024

It wasn't exactly "flaming June" but the sky was blue and the sun was shining as the ladies of Colsterworth WI met for their monthly meeting at the Sports and Social Club. After a bit of moving and shaking from the ever-patient Debbie, the room was set and we were ready to go. At 2pm Vanessa, our President, rang the bell and opened the meeting, welcoming the 22 members present.

Birthday cards and good wishes were given to Over the next 3 years the students learned five ladies, then Vanessa welcomed back Mrs Dorothy Wood whose talk "From Bus Pass to Student Card we were eagerly anticipating. Dorothy was a warm and engaging speaker. She had our attention from the start when she began by saying she had loathed her Grammar School and had left at the earliest opportunity. Dorothy married, brought up three children and worked as a hairdresser. Gradually, over the next 30 years she realised she had a dream, a goal, an ambition. The dream was to go to university. She was gradually accepted by the youngsters and a highlight of her 1st year was when she invited to go for a pizza and then on to a night club at Christmas. Yes, to the pizza, no to the night club.

Refreshed and replete, Vanessa called us back together for the second half of the meeting, the business section. It was agreed the D-Day tea party, held the previous week had been a great

success. Heather, looking stunning in her 1940s outfit complete with hat, dress and (dare I mention) seamed stockings, took a lot of photographs over the afternoon, one of which will hopefully feature in a Federation newsletter.

Names for the trip to Easton Walled Gardens were noted. This trip is on July 4th to see the sweet peas. Tickets for the annual WI raffle were advertised with some big prizes on offer. We were brought up to date about some Federation trips that are being planned. NATURAL HISTORY BULLETIN

On 24th June 2024 a list of plants in the Nature Trail Meadow found over fifty in flower. These included many associated with old limestone grasslands like Bladder Campion, Field Scabious and Greater Knapweed. In addition, a photo taken a few days before showed a single flowering spike of Common Broomrape a parasitic plant not common at all. What is equally interesting is that although surveys have been conducted here for many years (the first comprehensive one in 2006) it has never been recorded, here. It is unlikely to have come in "wildflower" seed. It has a history of being considered an agricultural weed. One strain of it lived on clover and could destroy a valuable component of the hay crop. It was illegal to sell clover seed that had not been "cleansed".

The Broomrapes are true parasites. They have no leaves. Their seeds must find the root system of a plant onto which they fasten and draw enough sustenance to germinate and eventually produce a flowering spike which emerges above ground to develop abundant dust-like seeds. Other plants, found locally, are hemi-parasites – they have some leaves but feed from the roots of others, simply weakening them.




Yellow Rattle weakens grasses and is used as a management tool in the Meadow at the Nature Trail so that other plants can survive better.

Two other hemi-parasites are Eyebright and Red Bartsia. Small and overlooked, they can in this way, flourish in the poorest of soils and conditions reducing the competition around them. Another plant causing interest this year is the Field Poppy - great swathes, turning the landscape red have appeared in cultivated fields. The seeds can remain dormant in the soil for many years until they are brought to the surface in cultivation when they have a higher rate of germination. This ability is also known in Broomrapes, all the more remarkable considering their seeds are as fine as dust.



MARBLED WHITE On 24th June at the Meadow the sun came out and with it some butterflies. Meadow Brown, Ringlets, Small Whites, Speckled Woods and best of all the first Marbled Whites. All these butterflies have caterpillars which feed on grasses at night and stay close to their bases during the day. Marbled Whites and Meadow Browns scatter their eggs randomly whilst in flight, whilst Speckled Woods lay them on vegetation one at a time. Marbled Whites and Meadow Browns overwinter as caterpillars forming a chrysalis just three weeks before emerging as an adult.

The Speckled Wood can have several broods in a year, the late one overwintering as a chrysalis. The scatterers of eggs compensate for the risky start in life by producing huge numbers of eggs. The parasitic Broomrape likewise produces clouds of dust-like seeds.



The value of regular observations in gardens can't be over emphasised.

In July young (and noisy) Jackdaws took central stage as they made their way in the world – standing up to Woodpigeons and trying everything from finding Leather Jackets in the lawns, to exploring pieces of plastic. Young Greater Spotted Woodpeckers were brought to feeders by parents. A Green Woodpecker landed on a path to feed on ants. A sadder tale is of poor success fledging House Sparrows and Blackbirds, and by the third week in July little attempt at second broods. Finally, Hedgehogs in gardens are a success story with the young out and about.
